<u>Attendance</u>

Attendance nationally and locally remains below pre-pandemic levels and attendance at Castlecroft is no different. We are being challenged by the local authority to improve attendance within school. Holidays in term time will not be authorised unless the circumstances are exceptional and may result in a fine being issued if it is for 5 days or more. At the moment whole school attendance stands at 93.7% which is slightly below the national average.

Our class attendance competition has been running for a number of years now and still remains popular with the children. Each week a pizza slice is awarded to the class with the highest attendance and the class that collects the most slices each term wins a pizza party.

On Wednesday 25th September, Year 3 went into the hall to learn about the Stone Age with a lady called Kathryn. First, we discussed what tools and weapons were used, they were very simple and made out of stone. We made flour by putting wheat in between two stones, one big, flat one and a small one. We pushed and pulled the stones to grind the wheat to make flour. We put the flour in a container but the Stone Age people would have made bread with it. Dressing up as Stone Aged people was fun and we walked around carefully with spears, keeping them safely away from our body.

Then, we went back into the classroom to make felt. On our desks we had a roll mat, some wool and a washing up liquid bottle with soapy water in it. We brushed and washed the two big clumps of sheep's wool. When the wool was smooth, we put the two pieces on the roll mat in different directions, like in Jenga. We put some cotton fabric on the wool and gently squeezed the soapy water out of it and then made the wool flat. Kathryn came round and put warm water on the wool. We kept squidging and rubbing it and then we rolled it up in the roll mat and rolled it hard so the wool mixed together. We then opened the mat, quarter turned the wool and rolled it again. We did this six times. When we took the wool out, it was starting to look more like felt. Kathryn washed and rinsed it and then we left it to dry on a paper towel with our names on. After lunch, we went back into the hall to look at the Iron Age, we discussed how it was different to the Stone Age. There were a lot more iron tools and weapons. We were allowed to explore. We could use the drill which was a stick with a string attached. You twisted and pulled the stick so the pointy bit of metal made a hole.

The soldiers had metal jackets and helmets which they wore to battle. The rich people's helmets had chainmail to protect their neck and back, but the poor people wore simpler helmets with less protection. The helmets were very heavy, like the shields which were too big for us to hold. My favourite part of the day was when we made bracelets out of coloured string. We used a forked twig to twist and pull the string to make the bracelet. We tied a knot in the string and then put them on our wrists.

I liked the Iron Age better as there were more things to do and more tools. I had a fun and interesting day because I love learning about history.
