

Emma showed us some photos of volcanoes above the clouds and some people get nose bleeds as it is so high or they have difficulty breathing because there is less oxygen up there.

We were escorted by the tour guide through this area and were told about the different planes and what they served as in the war. It was very interesting to learn about them. Then we were split into two groups, one group got to sit in some of the fighter planes with all the buttons and levers that the soldiers would have to memorise. While the other looked at the first bomber plane used in WWI. We then went into another exhibit, where we looked at tanks and miniature replicas of submarines.

After lunch, we went into the main part of the museum where various aircrafts like the Chinook helicopters and other planes were displayed. We were handed a quiz in which we had to find out different things about the aircrafts, like the name of it, where it was made and the serial number. After we had finished the quiz, we wandered around the area looking at screens and watching videos about what the war was like.

Our visit was full of so many interesting facts and seeing lots of things to do with the war made it more real and easier to remember.
